The University decided to revise the syllabus and the also changed the pattern to semester system. The syllabus for B. Ed course is revised based on value oriented, issue based, constructivist approach which inturn promotes development of teaching skills of student teachers. In addition, the revised syllabus is woven around inclusive education, community involvement, development of administrative skills and technology mediated transaction of the subjects.

Value oriented

Value oriented education aims at cultivating the desired behaviour and virtues. Value based education was incorporated with a view to develop the student teachers into human beings with integrity and character. In addition to the field trips, study tours and community living camps, the institution undertook voluntary social service at an old age home for men at Vellimadukunnu and at pain and palliative care centre, Medical College, Kozhikode. The institution is also collaboratively working on a minor project with Asha Kiran School, Devagiri, Medical College.

• Constructivist approach

Student centred constructivist approach is adopted by our institution for transacting the revised B. Ed and M. Ed curriculum. Seminars, workshops, co-operative and collaborative learning, debates, reflective practices, field trips, etc. are incorporated for effective transaction of curriculum.

Student function under close surveillance, supervision and guidance of faculties, were faculties serve as a scaffolder and resource person. Learner centered education is prioritised, where all educational activities are planned, according to the varying capabilities of the student teachers, where teachers and students become shareholders of knowledge. These practices help the students more efficient during school induction programmes.

• Issue based approach

Issue based approach is practiced by our institution such an attempt helps to sensitize the learners about the various issues faced by our community through the curricular material. The revised curriculum provides several opportunities to the students, which helps them to plan their lessons with a view to address social issues. It also promotes critical thinking abilities among students.

- A centralised allotment with single window system is followed for B.Ed admission which is closely monitored by Director of Collegiate education. Admissions are carried out purely on the basis of merit list published by LBS centre, the body in responsibility of registering the application, selection and publication of list.
- M.Ed admissions are based on the rank list from the entrance examinations carried out by University of Calicut.
- Quota admissions based on community, caste, disability and departmental merits are carried out adhering to government norms.

We have been doing many good practices in our institution for the personality development of our student teachers. Here we gives you details about two best practices and provides details on them.

- a. Empowerment of women b. Voluntary Social Service

The context that required initiation of the practice

The revised B.Ed curriculum is issue based and heavily learner centred. The issues dealt within the curriculum have direct association with the community of the learner lives in. The issues of the under privileged, gender disparity, need for essential care and support to the growing adolescents etc. have been incorporated into the revised curriculum.

Mere supply of theoretical knowledge, would have taken away from imparting the curriculum in its true sense. The practices of a full functional women's cell and voluntary social service unit was conceived with the idea of putting theory into practice, which proved to be very successful.

Objectives of the practice

The following objectives were behind the practices conceived.

- Women empowerment
- Addressing issues of the underprivileged
- Treating issues of gender disparity, with a sense of equal justice
- Direct community involvement
- Practicing collaborative learning
- Developing a sense of vocational independence in the disadvantaged sections of the community

The Practice

Women's cell

The major population of the B.Ed and M.Ed course generally consists of girl students, which made it inevitable to establish a common forum for redressal, support and empowerment.

The women's cell conducted several seminars, workshops, expert talks and competitions for spreading the message behind its constitution. The important programmes were

- Empowerment talk by Prof. Mallika of Zamorin's College, Kozhikode.
- Health and gynecological related medical class by Dr. Ranjini
- An awareness talk on pain and palliative care
- Quiz competition on World Women's Day
- A cooking class for starters on 16-06-2014
- Essay writing competition over the topic "She is Strength"
- A pottery making class by Saleena, student of Social Science Department.
- Debate on the topic "What does women really need equality or justice"

2. VOLUNTARY SOCIAL SERVICE UNIT

The voluntary social service unit of the institution undertook several programmes which proved out beneficial to the community. They are

- Visit to a old age men's home run by brothers of charity at Vellimadukunnu and rendering a days service.
- Visit to old aged women's home with a full day service, helping the inmates in their daily chores.
- Visit to the children's orphanage, supplying clothes and edible supplies to the members.
- Undertook a minor project at "Ashakiran" school for children with special needs at Medical College.
- Visit to Pain and Palliative Care Unit, Medical College
- Rendering help to the neighbouring school in the form of note books
- Extending further service through counseling and guidance classes to the nearby school students
- Enrichment classes for the students of nearby schools.

Obstacles faced any and methods adopted to overcome

Since both the practices were conceived with an objective of community involvement and betterment, no direct hindrances stood in the path of them. But the conservative societal stigma against

students learning more from outside the classroom, than within was apparent from certain sections. But with stubborn effort towards fruitfulness, all such thoughts were made to feel insignificant before the real cause. Though the efforts were designed for the betterment of the disadvantaged section reluctant nature and non-cooperation from certain section proved to be a small set back. Moreover incorporating the programmes of the women's cell and social service unit into the busy curricular schedule of B.Ed seemed as a hard nut, but was incorporated successfully.

Impact of the service

Both the practices formed to be successful in the light of the objectives around which they were conceived.

Majority of the students being girls, all the programmes organized by women's cell tuned out to be successful, both in terms of execution and transaction.

The expert talks over women empowerment made the girl students aware of their rights and the need to fight for them. The gynecological and health related medical class secured as an eye-opener towards several medical symptoms, which were till then, discarded as normal and irrelevant. The programmes organized by the women's cell gave the students any open forum for the redressal and grievances regarding limitations and shortcomings in the institution. It eventually strengthened their courage to stand up for common causes and issues of public interest. The competitions organized by the cell, was not only inspiring, but also very thought provoking. All the students and staff irrespective their gender, gained through the programmes of the women's cell. The activities of the women's cell were worth inspiring all the students and ensuring their participation and cooperation towards common endeavours. The voluntary social service unit started with very humble efforts like visit to old age homes, rendering the help and support to their routine course. Later they progressed, through collection of charity from the willing members of the institution and the community. Their functions took another leap, when they collected clothes for the inmates of the old age homes. They also supplied edible items towards their daily grocery reserve. The voluntary social service has definitely of labour in all the students involved. Taking pride in serving the community, was a significant outcome seen in all the members. Standing up for the underprivileged classes and allocating resources for such disadvantaged section, inculcated the feeling of universal brotherhood in the students. The direct community involvement, further helped them to gain relevant information regarding the immediate issues that required prompt attention.

The student teacher were at their best in organizing enrichment classes for students of the nearby government model HSS and executing them effectively. The look time from their entirely busy schedule for the students, was required extra care and support for the final examinations. Student teacher functioned excellently as a collective group attending every student individually and garnered reviews from the school authorities.

They took it as their personal responsibility to supply the notebooks to the needy students. The students were actively involved in providing the counseling and guidance to the required students, which helped them put their theoretical knowledge in educational psychology into practice. The efforts of the students to serve the society has been successful and widely appreciated. The direct involvement with the community and its members, created a sense of awareness in every student regarding the need for mutual cooperation and consideration for a better society. The first hand experience cultivated a sense of confidence and self esteem in the students which has inturn paven way to develop excellent leadership qualities in each are of them.

We have utilised all our available local and social resources for the attainment of these practices. We had offered our student teachers a variety of programmes which enabled them to meet the objectives of our best practices successfully.
